Example Question: Choose four statements which are true. [4 marks]	Example Question: Use details from both sources to write a summary of their differences. Make sure that you are shading the correct box/circle. If you make a mistake, follow the instruction on the paper. It will usually say to cross the box out. Try to do it in 3 minutes if possible – maximum 5 minutes! You may need to read between the lines. Statements are usually in chronological order. Do not choose any more than four statements for this question.	Cross out the word <u>summary</u> and replace it with <u>comparison</u>. Use PEE to structure your paragraphs. You don't need to talk about techniques, there are no marks for it. Your explanation must be detailed. Your answer <u>must</u> include comparison connectives focusing on similarities or differences. Try to make 2/3 comparisons in your answer. Spend 10/12 minutes on this question.	Focuses on one section of one extract only. You will be asked to discuss language and identify techniques that have been used. Aim to write three paragraphs to answer this question. Your explanation of writer's methods and their effects need to be detailed. Zoom in on key words and phrases. Spend around 15 minutes answering. Make sure that your answer is relevant to the focus.	You must refer to both sources when answering this. Aim to spend no more than 20 minutes answering. You should write around 4 paragraphs to answer. Include a variety of comparison connectives throughout your answer. You must identify techniques that have been used and consider their effect. Try to make multiple points of comparison throughout your response to the question.



Question 5 – The Creative Writing Question

You will be asked to write a letter, speech, article, leaflet, or essay based on a statement that you are given.

Use a range of **DAAFORRESTPIES** techniques in your writing to engage your reader.

Can use some **descriptive methods where appropriate**. – similes, metaphors...

You **must have a strong argument** – convince your reader/audience to believe you.

You **need to plan** so that your thoughts are organised and structured.

You must be using **paragraphs** to divide your ideas.

You can **take ideas from the reading section** to help you.

Make sure that you **write in an appropriate style** for the question.

Need to include – **variety of sentence starters, ambitious vocabulary and punctuation for effect**.

Ambitious Vocabulary:

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Non-Fiction Language Techniques:

- **Direct Address** – Talking directly to the reader/audience.
- **Alliteration** – Repetition of the same letter at the start of words.
- **Anecdote** – A short story or account of a personal experience.
- **Facts** – Something that is proven to be true.
- **Opinions** – A personal belief.
- **Rhetorical Question** – A question that doesn't need an answer.
- **Repetition** – Saying something more than once.
- **Exaggeration** – Making something sound worse/better than it is.
- **Statistics** – Using numbers to support a point.
- **Triple** – Supporting a point with three things.
- **Pronouns** – Referring directly to participants.
- **Imperatives** – Commands.
- **Emotive Language** – Making the reader feel a certain way.
- **Superlatives** – The highest degree of something.

Comparison Connectives

Similar – Also, in addition, likewise, similarly, in a similar way, equally

Different – However, on the other hand, in comparison, in contrast, contrastingly, alternatively, conversely

- DAAFORRESTPIES techniques need to be included where appropriate.
- Paragraphs should be used throughout.
- A range of **ambitious** vocabulary.
- Letters should have an address, start with "Dear..." and end with "Yours Sincerely/Faithfully".
- Speeches should be **confident** and **clear** and engage the listener.
- Newspaper articles should have a **headline** to engage the reader.
- All pieces should have a **strong argument** presented throughout.
